SENATE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION NO. 3

CONSTITUTIONAL CONVENTION

(By Senators Girard and Knauss)

SUBMITTING TO THE QUALIFIED ELECTORS OF THE STATE OF COLORADO THE QUESTION OF HOLDING A CONVENTION TO REVISE, ALTER AND AMEND THE CONSTITUTION OF THE STATE OF COLORADO.

Be It Resolved, by the Senate of the Twenty-third General Assembly, the House of Representatives concurring:

Section 1. That there be submitted to the qualified electors of the State of Colorado at the next general election, for members of the next General Assembly, for their approval or rejection, the question of holding a convention to revise, alter and amend the present constitution of the State of Colorado, which, when ratified and approved by a majority of those voting thereon, shall authorize the General Assembly at its next Session to provide for the calling of a constitutional convention, as provided in Section 1 of Article 19 of the Constitution.

Section 2. The submission of said question shall be duly advertised and certified and placed on the official ballots at the next annual election for the election of members to the General Assembly in like manner as amendments to the Constitution.

Section 3. Each elector voting at said election and desiring to vote for holding a convention to revise, alter and amend the Constitution of Colorado, shall place in the ballot box his or her ticket, whereon shall be printed the words "For Holding a Convention to Revise, Alter and Amend the Constitution of Colorado," and "Against Holding a Convention to Revise, Alter and Amend the Constitution of Colorado," and shall indicate his or her choice by placing a cross opposite one or the other of said groups of words.

Section 4. The votes cast for the adoption or rejection of said question shall be canvassed and the result determined by the laws of the State for the canvass of votes for Representatives in Congress.
